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RULES OF PLAY

For 3, 4, 5 or 6 players

INTRODUCTION

This game is unlike any other. All of the characters are fictitious — even the "victim" is imagined. It is like a stage play.

The scene opens in Mr. Boddy's palatial mansion. Mr. Boddy is the victim of foul play and is found in one of the rooms.

THE OBJECT OF THE GAME is to discover the answer to these three questions:

1st. WHO? Which one of the several suspects did it?

2nd. WHERE?

3rd. HOW?

The answer lies in the little black envelope resting on the stairway marked X in the center of the board. The envelope contains 3 cards. One card tells who did it — another card reveals the room in which it all happened, and the third card discloses the weapon used.

The player who, by the process of deduction and good plain common sense, first identifies the 3 solution cards hidden in the little black envelope, wins the game.

This is accomplished by players moving into the rooms and making "suggestions" of what they believe is the room, the person and the weapon for the purpose of gaining information. This information may reveal which cards are in other player's hands and which cards are missing and must, therefore, be hidden in the little black envelope. "Accusing" a suspect and naming the weapon and the room under suspicion is one of the most exciting features of this game.

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

1979—"Harvey"

he Rest is History...Back in the summer of 1968 a group of Valley transplants (Tony Egan, Bob Law, and Gary Murdock) were looking for something to do in the summer and Bob, an off Broadway actor during his years in NYC, came up with the idea of forming a summer theater group. They were shortly joined by Dale Stetson, a retired Broadway set designer (and the original owner of the West Hill House B & B). They made a makeshift stage in the original Sugarbush Gate House Lodge and entertained the community for about 5 years. As The Valley grew and there were more summer activities available, the group found themselves getting involved in other projects and disbanded.

The Valley remained theaterless for about 5 years. Then, during a long cold winter in 1978, Jennifer Howard, with much encouragement from Mitchell Kontoff, started a play reading group. Throughout that winter, this small but hardy group met at each other's houses reading plays and eating food. Finally, in the spring, much like Spanky and Our Gang, they announced, "Hey, let's put on a play!" "Harvey" was chosen. Mitchell, the producer, borrowed the Fayston Elementary School gym. With seed money from the original "Players", Don Hirsch built a gorgeous solid set. Tony Egan produced a trellis from his home. Edsel Hughes from Montpelier agreed to direct for the price of gas. This went so well that they decided to put on another production – "Cactus Flower", although they had no home. They found the Odd Fellows Hall and, thanks to some great negotiating by David Steinman and others, they moved in two weeks before opening night.

And the rest is history.

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

About Our Building

This building is among the oldest and most historic in Waitsfield Village. Known as "The Old Brick Church" when it was constructed in the mid 1830's, it originally was one story with a high peaked roof and a series of eight magnificent arched windows along each side of the nave. Like many of the buildings in the village, it was designed and built under the scrutiny of the Richardson Family. The Oddfellows purchased the building in 1903, added a second floor (you can see the bar joists in the ceiling) to accommodate meeting space and constructed a flat roof, squaring off the windows. They rented the ground floor to various enterprises over the years.

The Nellie Gill Players, a Vermont-based company, performed here in the early '20s and '30s and utilized much local talent. Fletcher Joslin of Waitsfield reported that silent movies were shown here and "a lady from Warren came down and played the piano in accompaniment." He also remembered that prior to 1930, the Waitsfield High School basketball in the building.

With the advent of war in the 1940s, New York City teenagers came to the Valley to help get in the crops and work on the many farms that were hurting for labor due to "the boys" being off at war. This effort, run by Alfred Baruth of the Horace Mann School in NYC, was originally housed at Knoll Farm.

In the evening, the teens became talented thespians, putting on shows in the Oddfellows Hall. Baruth called this project Camp MacArthur in reference to General Douglas MacArthur, the hero of the day. After the war, the focus was much more on theater and the camp moved to what is now the Tex Thompson farm on the Loop Road. Thank you to Mary Alice Bisbee for researching this part of the history.




